Norman P. Robison

July 24, 1917 — Jan. 10, 2000

Known for his kind heart, Norman Pennington Robison died in Port Angeles at the age of 82.

Mr. Robison was born in Hannibal, Mo., to Charles Victor and Edith Myrtle (Pennington) Robison.

He attended 1 year of college at the University of Washington and spent four years in the Navy, serving aboard the *USS Maryland*.

On Sept. 3, 1939, he married Helen L. Schoenfeld in Long Beach, Calif.; she died on May 16, 1993.

After leaving the military, Mr.

Robison worked in Seattle for Griffin Fuel Co. He was a King County Sheriff's deputy in the late 1950s and began a real estate career in 1959.

In 1964 he moved to the Gardiner area on the Olympic Peninsula, and continued to work in real estate. He served as fire commissioner for the Gardiner Volunteer Fire Department.

Mr. Robison was a true outdoorsman, "born with a fishing pole in one hand and a shotgun in the other." He had a wonderful sense of humor and story-telling skills. His family particularly remembers his kind heart and his

great sense of adventure.

After moving to Sequim in 1998, his "family" grew with the addition of many friends at Prairie Springs Assisted Living.

Survivors include daughter and son-in-law Nancy and Lee Schenk and daughter Ritta A. Gaddis, all of Everett; two grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
